Re: Please Investigate the Fraud, Retaliation, and Family Destruction Surrounding Malaika and Xayah Robinson

Dear Vice President Vance:

I am writing to you again because I just watched you speaking about fraud, and I am asking you to please look at what is happening in San Diego County. I have already sent your office material concerning my granddaughters, Malaika and Xayah Robinson. I am asking you now, as directly as I can: please help stop what is happening to these children and this family.

For more than two years, Malaika and Xayah have been kept from their mother, father, grandfather, siblings, and extended family through San Diego County's child-welfare and dependency-court system. These girls are not without family. Their mother, Evelyn Lopez, participated in services, therapy, visitation, and reunification efforts and progressed to unsupervised visits. Workers documented her parenting and the bond with her daughters. I was approved through the County's Resource Family Approval process as paternal family placement.

Then our family began exposing what we were seeing.

We spoke publicly. We appeared before the San Diego County Board of Supervisors. We maintained a website, distributed flyers, protested, contacted journalists, named officials, and refused to remain silent. After that protected speech, restrictions intensified, accusations multiplied, family contact was reduced, and the narrative surrounding our family changed dramatically. Our family has evidence documenting retaliation, contradictory reporting, coercive pressure, interference with family relationships, and what we describe as a case-fixing campaign that ultimately ended with parental rights being terminated.

An expert testified that severing these family relationships would cause catastrophic psychological and emotional harm. Yet the system proceeded anyway. Malaika and Xayah remain separated from their family while their mother continues caring for her younger children. That contradiction alone should make someone in authority stop and ask what is going on.

Vice President Vance, you are speaking publicly about fraud. I am asking you to examine whether federal money is helping sustain a child-welfare system that financially rewards removal, foster placement, and adoption while families trying to reunify are pushed aside. I am asking for scrutiny of how federal child-welfare funds are being used in San Diego

County, whether decisions affecting children are being driven by legitimate protection concerns or by institutional and financial incentives, and whether public money is supporting retaliation and unnecessary family separation.

Parents and grandparents across America are saying the same thing: once government child-welfare systems take control of children, families can find themselves trapped inside closed proceedings where the agency, County Counsel, guardians ad litem, private caregivers, and courts possess enormous power while meaningful outside investigation is almost nonexistent.

Our family has contacted elected officials, civil-rights authorities, law enforcement, journalists, advocates, the White House, and others across the country. Today alone I sent material to nine television stations, a major San Diego newspaper, and the Sheriff's station where deputies witnessed Malaika and Xayah holding pink I LOVE MOM signs.

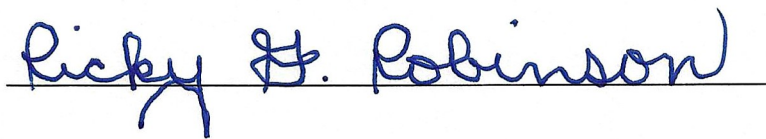
Please have someone outside San Diego County examine this case. Follow the money. Examine the federal funding. Examine the retaliation after protected speech. Examine the reports against the underlying evidence. Examine the restraining-order proceedings, the guardian ad litem's conduct, County Counsel, Child Welfare Services, private caregiver influence, and the dependency-court process. Determine whether federal civil-rights laws or other laws have been violated and whether federal funds have been misused.

Most importantly, please help Malaika and Xayah.

They have already lost more than two years of their childhood with their family. Their great-grandmother died during this case. Their mother has been devastated. Their grandfather has fought every day to keep their names and their story from disappearing. An expert warned that these girls face catastrophic psychological and emotional harm from the destruction of these family bonds.

Please help bring Malaika and Xayah home.
