This is not a request. This is a demand for immediate intervention by the California Department of Social Services into one of the most grotesque miscarriages of justice ever inflicted on a San Diego family. Malaika and Xayah Robinson remain separated from their mother, father, grandparents, extended blood family, and younger siblings they have never even been allowed to meet, under a parental-rights termination produced by a child-welfare system running rabid with power, retaliation, and contempt for constitutional rights.

Our family exposed false reporting, case fixing, retaliation, coercion, abuse of authority, fabricated psychological narratives by people with no medical license, pressure placed on a three-year-old child without independent representation, and repeated distortion of the truth to justify continued family separation. We exposed it publicly, exercised protected speech, and refused to remain silent. The response was retaliation — disappearing visits, manufactured accusations, restraining orders, escalating government pressure, and officials closing ranks against a law-abiding family.

Director Troia, use every lawful authority available to your department to force an immediate independent state-level review of what San Diego County Child and Family Well-Being continues doing to this family. Do not send this back into the same San Diego machinery that created and continues defending the injustice. This is not another complaint, referral, internal review, or request for an agency explanation. This is a demand for intervention, accountability, and restoration of this family.

Evelyn Lopez completed what Child Welfare demanded and progressed to months of unsupervised visitation with her daughters. We have a social worker recorded telling her, in substance, that if she moved out of my home her children would be returned, but if she remained there they would not. San Diego County had already approved me and that same family home through RFA for placement of Malaika and Xayah. Instead of reunification, the pressure intensified and the reports continued.

The retaliation is impossible to ignore. Our family exposed misconduct through a website, public speech, podcasts, flyers, Board of Supervisors appearances, recordings, and direct outreach. Agency reports themselves repeatedly focus on that protected speech and public exposure. Then visits disappear, new accusations appear, family members are removed, and restraining orders follow. A child-welfare agency does not get to weaponize government authority against a family because that family exposes its conduct.

Meanwhile, Malaika and Xayah continue showing the damage. Our family documents screaming, severe meltdowns, head-banging, hospitalizations, abuse concerns, and

children begging not to leave their mother. A neurotherapist conducting a bond study personally witnesses Malaika suffer a meltdown lasting more than 25 minutes because she does not want to leave her mother and return to the mean caregiver. She also exposes that social workers would close their laptops five to ten minutes before visits ended — before the worst trauma began when the girls realized they had to leave their mother — and then reports portrayed everything as normal and claimed there was no meaningful bond. She warns of catastrophic psychological and emotional harm from severing these family bonds. The termination stands anyway. The harm continues.

Look at the photograph in this article. Malaika and Xayah are holding pink signs that say I Love Mom while a sheriff's deputy stands nearby outside the doorway and this same system continues separating them from their mother and family. How sick is that? How dare government bureaucrats call this protection while causing catastrophic psychological and emotional harm to two little girls and unbearable shock and trauma to their mother. This is not child protection. It is government-inflicted family destruction.

What should alarm your department is the sheer scale of government involvement against one family. Social workers, supervisors, County Counsel, the guardian ad litem's office, appointed attorneys, investigators, multiple judges, and private citizens have become part of a case generating thousands of pages of reports, repeated accusations, restraining orders, hearings, and more than two years of family separation. The scale itself demands outside intervention.

Malaika and Xayah's great-grandmother died during the chaos, retaliation, false reporting, coercion, and relentless pressure surrounding this case. She died without seeing the girls returned to their family. The destruction reaches across generations.

I have repeatedly reached out to state and federal officials and agencies, including the White House, the President, the First Lady, the Vice President, attorneys general, elected officials, investigators, and oversight offices. I will continue putting this evidence before anyone with the authority to act. I will not give up, surrender, or stop fighting for Malaika and Xayah while this harm continues.

I am demanding that CDSS independently examine the retaliation, false reporting, coercion, abuse of authority, handling of abuse concerns, interference with protected speech and familial association, RFA placement decisions, restrictions on family visitation, and the circumstances surrounding the termination of parental rights. Preserve the records. Examine the recordings. Examine the reports. Examine what officials know about the children's trauma, how they respond to those warnings, and why this separation continues.

Do not allow San Diego County to investigate itself and call that accountability. California has a responsibility to act when a county child-welfare system becomes incapable of policing its own conduct. Malaika and Xayah have a mother, father, grandparents, siblings, cousins, and extended family that continue fighting for them. We are not disappearing, surrendering our constitutional rights, or remaining silent while catastrophic harm continues.

Malaika and Xayah need to come home.

Please be advised that this letter and supporting materials may be published online or made available to journalists and the public to document this case, preserve the record, obtain independent review, seek accountability, and ensure that what is happening to Malaika and Xayah is never buried, rewritten, forgotten, or denied.
