

Lara Trump,

This is an urgent plea from a grandfather fighting to save his granddaughters from ongoing government retaliation, forced family separation, and catastrophic psychological and emotional harm.

My name is Ricky G. Robinson. My granddaughters, Malaika and Xayah Robinson, were wrongfully taken from their family through the San Diego County child-welfare system. What should have been temporary assistance for a young mother struggling after childbirth became a grudge-driven campaign involving forced isolation, shifting accusations, false and misleading records, documented false sworn testimony, and retaliation against everyone who spoke publicly.

Their mother, Evelyn Lopez, completed every class, counseling session, parenting program, therapy requirement, and service demanded of her. Each time she satisfied one requirement, the agency created another barrier. She was pressured to move away from her County-approved paternal-family support and told the children would not be returned while she lived in the home of their paternal grandfather—a home already investigated, cleared, and approved by the County.

When our family began exposing what was happening through a public website, podcasts, flyers, Board of Supervisors meetings, videos, and investigative reporting, the retaliation intensified. Visits were taken away. Family relationships were attacked. Advocates and journalists were targeted and mischaracterized in official records. Restraining orders were pursued against me involving my own granddaughters, even though the testimony against me repeatedly focused on my blog, public criticism, photographs, rallies, and refusal to stop speaking—not violence, stalking, or any actual threat to the children.

A neurotherapist testified in court for two days that Malaika and Xayah shared a strong bond with their mother and that severing that bond would cause catastrophic psychological and emotional harm. She also testified that social workers closed their laptops before the children's worst end-of-visit trauma began, leaving that suffering out of their reports. Videos show the girls screaming, pulling their hair, and desperately crying for their family.

The children's great-grandmother was an elderly dependent woman with dementia who loved them deeply. I cared for her as her caregiver, conservator, and trustee. Malaika and Xayah were never allowed to enter her home and see her again. She died at age 88 without ever seeing them return.

Evelyn is now safely raising twins whom she has cared for continuously since their birth in November, yet she remains prevented from seeing or speaking with Malaika and Xayah. The older girls have never been allowed to meet the twins. The same system accepts that Evelyn can safely raise those children while continuing to destroy her relationship with her older daughters.

Our evidence includes recordings, messages, official reports, medical records, court documents, videos, witness testimony, and independent investigative reporting. It shows an ongoing pattern of First and Fourteenth Amendment violations, retaliation for protected speech, an orchestrated alignment between public officials and private caregivers, including Norma Olivares, and misuse of federally funded foster care to prolong family separation instead of supporting safe reunification or approved family placement.

I am asking you to help bring national attention to this case, connect our family with federal civil-rights officials, journalists, attorneys, and investigators, and demand an independent investigation into San Diego County's child-welfare system.

Photographs of Malaika, Xayah, and our family are enclosed. Please look at their faces and understand the human cost of what has been done to Malaika, Xayah, and our entire family.

I will not stop documenting, publishing, and fighting until the truth is exposed and Malaika and Xayah are brought home.

Please help us bring Malaika and Xayah home.

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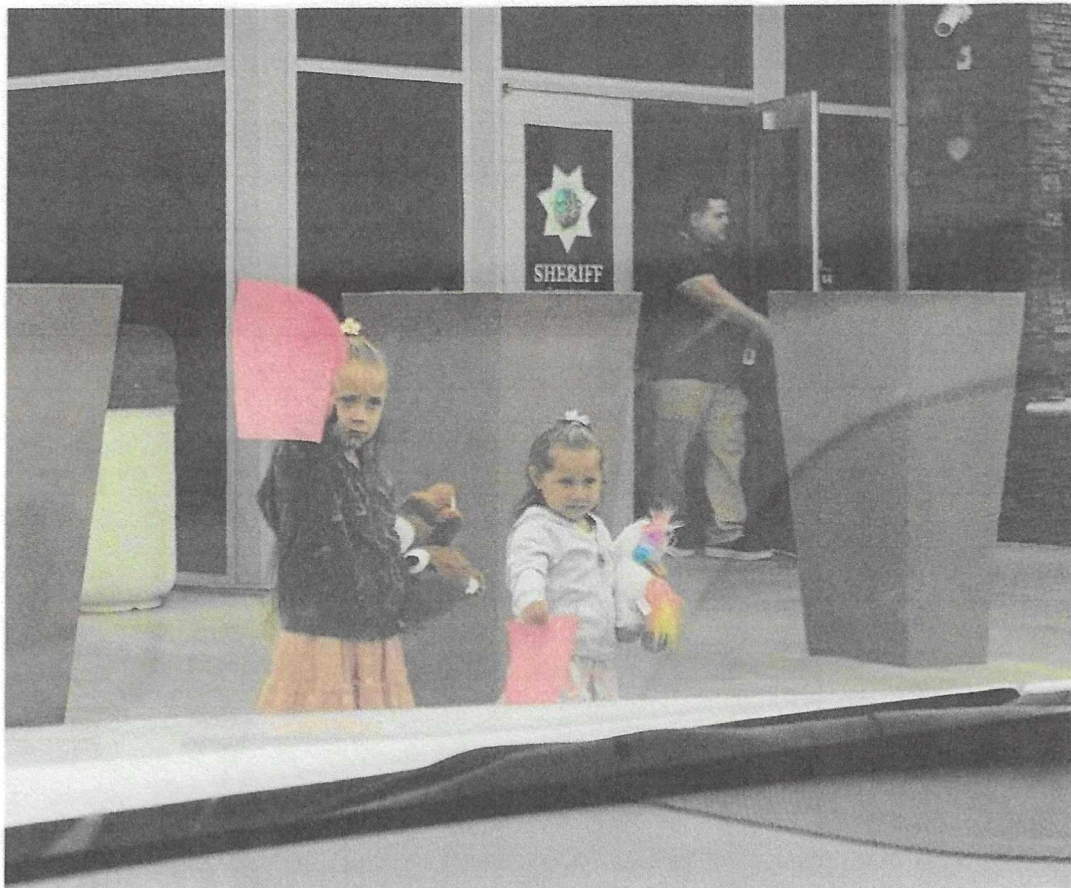
"I Love Mom": San Diego Girls Forced to Say Goodbye During Final Visit After Judge Terminates Mother's Parental Rights

California's Court Crisis —It's Extreme

SAN DIEGO, Calif. — On June 4, San Diego mother Evelyn Lopez and her two young daughters were brought together for what family

members describe as their final visit after a San Diego Juvenile Court judge terminated Lopez's parental rights on May 26.

The final visit took place at the Sheriff's Station, located at 11486 Campo Road in Spring Valley, California, where photographs obtained by *Unveiled and Uncensored* show Malaika, who turns 5 in November, and her 3-year-old sister Xayah holding handmade pink signs bearing messages including "I ♥ Mom" and "I Love Mom."

Family members say the children were emotional as they said goodbye to the only mother they have ever known and loved.

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The visit came just days after newly appointed San Diego Juvenile Court Judge Devon L. Lomayesva terminated Lopez's parental rights despite years of visitation records, emotional video footage, and expert testimony that supporters say documented a strong and loving bond between the children and their mother.

Photographs from the final visit have quickly become symbolic of the central dispute surrounding the case: whether a court should permanently sever a parent-child relationship when county records, visitation observations, emotional video footage, and expert testimony documented an ongoing maternal bond.

For supporters of the family, the image of two young girls holding signs reading "I Love Mom" outside a Sheriff's station only days after their mother's parental rights were terminated raises broader questions about family preservation, judicial decision-making, and the extraordinary power dependency courts exercise over the lives of children and families.

How to Help

In addition to pursuing an appeal, family members say they are actively seeking legal representation to explore potential civil claims against San Diego County and Child Welfare Services arising from the handling of the case.

They are asking attorneys, civil rights organizations, legal advocacy groups, and others willing to assist with the matter to contact the family regarding potential representation, appellate support, or further legal review.

For now, Evelyn Lopez's fight to remain connected to her daughters continues in California's appellate courts. While appellate proceedings can take years to resolve, those close to the case hope additional media attention and legal scrutiny will bring greater examination of what they believe are profound questions involving family preservation, due process, governmental accountability, and the dependency system's extraordinary power to permanently separate children from their biological families.

As Lopez's appeal moves forward, those questions are now likely headed to California's appellate courts.

This ongoing series on the California family and probate court and CPS corruption crisis—and the broader nationwide family court crisis—aims to bring national attention to systemic failures and to advocate for meaningful reform and accountability.

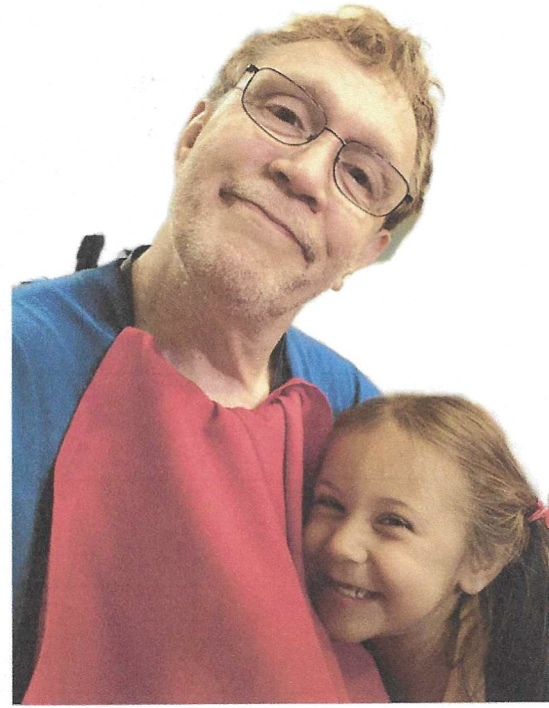
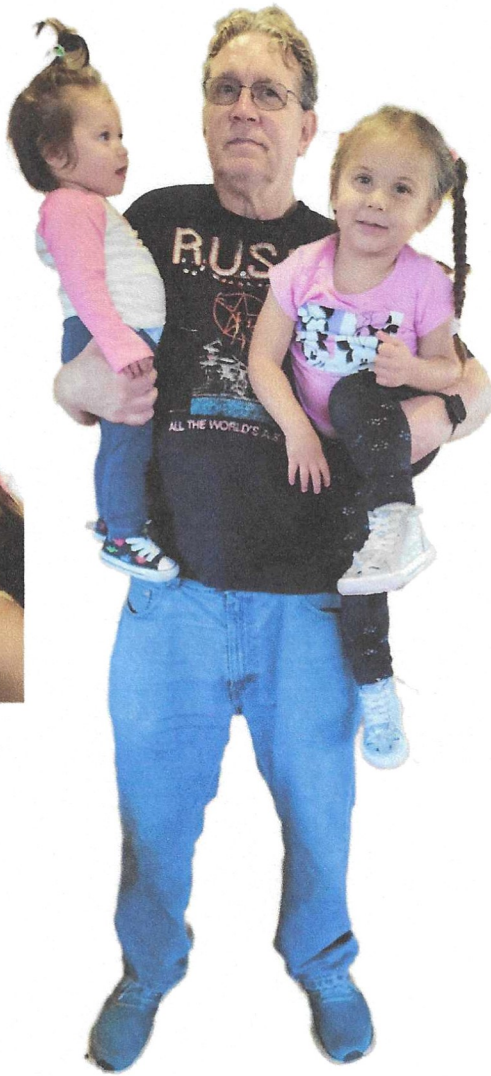
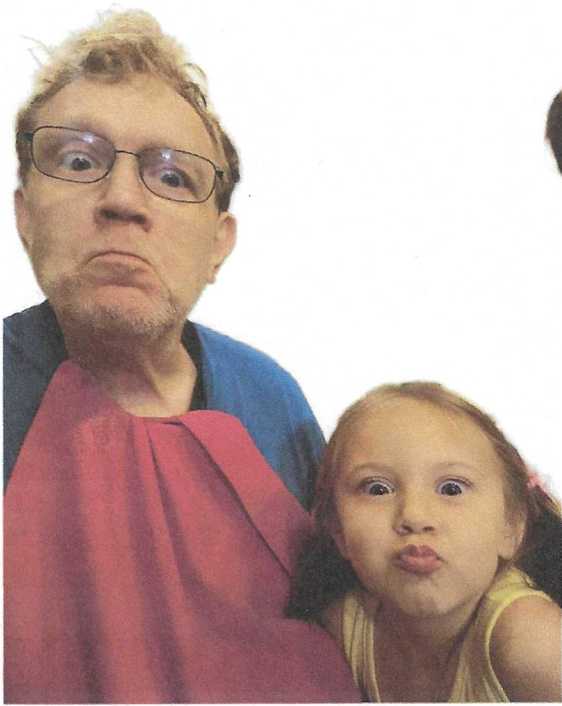
