

Senator Moreno:

I watched you confront Dr. Anthony Fauci and demand accountability for the treatment of an American mother and her family. Your willingness to challenge powerful government officials is the reason I am writing to you today.

For more than two years, my family has endured what I contend is one of the most extreme examples of child-welfare fraud, retaliation, case-fixing, false records, and coordinated abuse of government power directed against a family. My granddaughters, Malaika and Xayah Robinson, remain separated from the family that has fought relentlessly to bring them home, even though official records repeatedly state they were not abused or neglected. This case should have ended more than a year and a half ago. Instead, officials have continued manufacturing allegations, manipulating records, extending litigation, and using government authority to punish our family for exposing misconduct.

While Evelyn Lopez, the mother of Malaika and Xayah, was in Missouri, California child-welfare workers and a private caregiver pressured her to return by threatening that the United States Marshals, Border Patrol, and other law-enforcement agencies would come after her. Missouri's Children's Division was contacted, and a worker named Jane stated that the circumstances did not meet the criteria for child abuse or neglect. Evelyn returned to California, turned herself in, and a breastfeeding mother was jailed for five days, causing her to miss her daughter's first birthday, before being released without criminal charges. That did not end the attack. It intensified it.

Our evidence includes recordings, sworn statements, court records, medical records, text messages, agency reports, retaliatory threats, false allegations, restraining orders, documented contradictions, paper trails, and recorded admissions. Officials have carried out retaliation openly and in broad daylight, acting as though they are untouchable and above the law.

Under the guise of child protection, these officials are terrorizing families. Title IV-E funds and other public resources are being used to prolong family separation while millions of taxpayer dollars continue flowing through a system that rewards unnecessary placements, services, contractors, attorneys, and years of litigation. They are creating behavioral-health crises in the very children and families they claim to protect.

My family has fought constantly for Malaika and Xayah. Independent investigators, advocates, journalists, investigative reporters, licensed social workers, and other professionals have helped document and amplify our case. An elected school-board official has addressed the San Diego County Board of Supervisors twice, publicly calling attention to what is happening to Malaika and Xayah and urging action.

My 88-year-old mother died during this ordeal without ever seeing her great-granddaughters returned to their family. Malaika and Xayah have lost irreplaceable time with their mother, grandparents, great-grandmother, siblings, and extended family. The catastrophic psychological and emotional harm continues today.

I respectfully ask you to demand congressional oversight and an independent federal investigation outside San Diego County and outside California. The investigation should examine child-welfare fraud, misuse of federal funding, falsified and manipulated records, retaliation for protected speech, coordinated abuse of authority, obstruction, judge and forum shopping, and the use of restraining orders and courts to silence families and witnesses.

If at all possible, I would be grateful if you could speak with Audra Morgan @eyeofthestorm. She is an independent investigator, reporter, and advocate for Evelyn Lopez who has worked closely on our case for nearly two years and helped bring it to public attention. She knows our case inside and out, understands the broader pattern affecting other families, and would welcome the opportunity to speak with you.

We also have an 84-year-old civil-rights attorney who has practiced law for more than 50 years and was among the first Black women to intern at the White House during the civil-rights movement. She is prepared to discuss her concerns about the foster-care system. Licensed social workers in Georgia are also prepared to speak out about what they have witnessed.

Senator Moreno, you challenged powerful officials when you believed government had lost sight of the people it was supposed to serve. I am asking you to bring that same courage and determination to what has happened to Malaika and Xayah Robinson and to the many other families who deserve accountability and an independent review.
